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Career Education by the Book

Have you ever wondered what resources are available to help plan a lesson on résumé writing? Have you wondered what to do with the *Job Seeker's Handbook* in your classroom? Or, have you needed a resource for a specific audience of students, e.g., Aboriginal students or students with disabilities?

Alberta Human Resources and Employment (AHRE) has launched a new feature through the [Alberta Learning Information Service \(ALIS\)](#)—the [Facilitator's Guide to Career Resources](#).

The Facilitator's Guide to Career Resources is an online shortcut to help find career, learning and employment information in AHRE's print career resources. Teachers can search for information by topic, publication name, exercise type or audience; these categories of the guide are growing all the time.

For example, selecting "brainstorming" from the [exercise search list](#) will lead to [brainstorming activities](#) in 17 publications. Clicking on the word "brainstorming" on that page will lead to an [Additional Instructions](#) page that provides step-by-step instructions on facilitating brainstorming activities as well as offering some ideas for debriefing.

Whichever way a search is started, the user will arrive at a chart that identifies the publication, the topic, the exercise and the page number of the specific activity within the AHRE print resource. Clicking on the publication name will lead to a downloadable version of the publication. The user can simply print the pages required. In this way, it is no longer necessary to order a class set of resources, unless that is desired.

CTS Conference 2003: Focus on the Future

The CTS Council of the Alberta Teachers' Association is holding its annual CTS Conference in Edmonton at the Fantasyland Hotel and the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT) on April 24-26, 2003.

A number of sessions and hands-on workshops are being planned for the conference. While many of the sessions will be offered at the Fantasyland Hotel, NAIT will be the host facility for most of the hands-on workshops. Teachers are encouraged to register early for the conference, as the workshops are open to a limited number of participants.

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Programming for Application and Transfer of Learning

The administration of integrating CTS courses with non-CTS courses has caused some confusion for school administrators, students and parents in terms of course requirements, instructional hours and the applicable credit allocations.

As a means of providing clarity in this area, the following sections of the *Guide to Education: ECS to Grade 12* will be removed: Access to Instruction for Integrated CTS Courses/Offering a CTS Course with a Non-CTS Course (page 39) and Examples of Practices for Offering a CTS Course with a Non-CTS Course (page 40). A new section, Programming for Application and Transfer of Learning, will be added as follows:

- To enhance student learning, senior high school programming and course timetabling should provide students with the opportunity to transfer learning to other areas.
- Within each course, students have opportunities to apply their learning. As well, student learning may be extended through the application of the outcomes in one course to the outcomes in other courses. Educators are encouraged to use planning and course timetabling to capitalize on opportunities for connections within and across subjects in order to strengthen student learning.
- All senior high school courses offered to students must be appropriately timetabled, taught, assessed and reported to Alberta Learning.
- For funding conditions for grades 10-12, school authorities should consult the current [Funding Manual for School Authorities](#).

The intent of this change to the guide is not to limit programming options for students, but instead to provide clarity and to eliminate confusion around requirements that every course be appropriately timetabled, taught and assessed.

The revised *Guide to Education: ECS to Grade 12* for 2003-2004 will be sent to all superintendents and school principals in April 2003 and will be in effect on September 1, 2003. Similar changes will be made to the *CTS Manual for Administrators, Counsellors and Teachers* through the 2003 amendments.

Authorized Resources for Senior High School

Provincial implementation of the new Program of Studies for Senior High School English Language Arts will be completed as of September 2003. Many new senior high school English language arts learning and teaching resources have been approved to support the program. Current authorized learning and teaching resources will be phased-out gradually. There are also over 50 authorized teacher professional resources for use with the new program, available for grades 10 to 12 and covering a variety of topics such as reading and writing poetry, approaches to new information technologies, and teaching film.

Senior High School Update

Provincial Implementation of ELA 20-1 and ELA 20-2

Provincial implementation of ELA 20-1 and ELA 20-2 occurred in September 2002; ELA 20-1 replaced English 20, and ELA 20-2 replaced English 23. A copy of the [Program of Studies for Senior High School English Language Arts](#), Interim 2002, was distributed to every superintendent and senior high school principal in Alberta in August 2002.

Provincial Implementation of ELA 30-1 and ELA 30-2

Provincial implementation of ELA 30-1 and ELA 30-2 will occur in September 2003; ELA 30-1 will replace English 30, and ELA 30-2 will replace English 33. A copy of the revised Program of Studies for Senior High School English Language Arts is scheduled to be distributed to every superintendent and senior high school principal in Alberta in June 2003.

Focus on Inquiry

Alberta Learning has contracted Dr. Jennifer Branch, University of Alberta, to coordinate a review and update of [Focus on Research: A Guide to Developing Students' Research Skills](#), 1990. Prior to developing a draft document, Dr. Branch is conducting several focus groups throughout the province.

Focus on Inquiry, scheduled to be available online in the 2003-2004 school year, will provide strategies for teachers to use as they work to improve student learning and achievement through the integration of technology with the curriculum and through inquiry-based learning. The proposed document will provide teachers with up-to-date supports that will assist in the implementation of new curricula; e.g., information and communication technology (ICT), English language arts, science, social studies, CALM and health and life skills. A draft document is scheduled to be sent to schools this spring for feedback.

Learning and Teaching Resources Update

Dr. Lyle Oberg, Minister of Learning, recently announced an additional \$20 million in education spending, which will make it possible for school boards to purchase new resources for use in their classrooms. In May 2003, each school board will receive a credit to purchase textbooks, reference materials, teacher guides and multimedia resources through the Learning Resources Centre.

Calls for Proposals and Resource Development

In the Call for Proposals, publishers/developers will be provided with criteria and asked to create a proposal demonstrating what they believe they can develop as a resource for a particular grade. Curriculum fit and Recognizing Diversity and Promoting Respect criteria are two of the essential components of the call's criteria. The call will also contain information regarding future calls for proposals for grades 10-12.

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LearnAlberta.ca Update

Redesign of LearnAlberta.ca

Coming in the spring of 2003, the LearnAlberta.ca Web site will have a new look and logo. The revamped Web site will feature improved navigation to make it easy for students, teachers and parents to find resources. It will contain the same great resources as well as new ones in physics, English language arts and mathematics.

National Geographic Science Centre

The National Geographic Science Centre will soon be available on the [LearnAlberta.ca](#) Web site. The first unit, Planet Earth, is currently being field tested in approximately 10 classrooms within Edmonton Public Schools. This unit is correlated to Alberta's Grade 7 science outcomes and includes images, maps, activities, games, glossaries and streaming videos. An elementary unit, Weather Watch, will be field tested this spring. It is anticipated that the remaining 14 units will be completed by the fall of 2003.
